JUNE 2nd 1953 CORONATION CELEBRATIONS STANSTEAD ABBOTTS, ST. MARGARETS AND GREAT AMWELL


In May of 1953 the weather had been very good with weeks of very summery warm weather. Eight days before the Coronation the Whit Monday bank holiday had seen temperatures above 30 centigrade. However from the following day much colder conditions were experienced. The organisers of the coronation celebrations in the three parishes must have been decidedly disconcerted when temperatures began to fall dramatically as the big day drew nearer. Coronation Day turned out to be more akin to a miserable November day with temperatures barely reaching a maximum of 11 degrees centigrade in the village. The day was overcast with some rain showers and a noticeably chilly north to north east wind which made it feel colder than it actually was.

People awoke to the news that Hillary and Tensing had conquered Mount Everest on May 29th. This was reported exclusively in the Times newspaper but to everybody of course via the radio. It is interesting to reflect that it took days for the news of this achievement to reach the England and that for many people in the village they would have heard this news on a radio powered by a wet cell battery which would need regular recharging courtesy of Andersons shop in the High Street.
